

Application for Partial Studies for 2021/2022

FAQ

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Question related to courses, partial study abroad, Brexit, 21 credit regulation, reduced curriculum

I am a Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship student. Can apply for a partial studies abroad semester?

No. As you are already the beneficiary of a scholarship from the Hungarian government, you are not eligible to participate in any programs that would give you another scholarship in parallel.

As a first year master degree student in my first semester of studies coming from another university – can I apply for the partial study abroad?

Yes. In the case of first year students, points will be calculated based on the first semester's GPA. The student will have to have two completed semesters at the time of going on the partial study abroad period (i.e. they cannot be on passive semester in spring 2021.) The point system differs for first- and higher year students – this is detailed in the Call for Applications.

If I am in my first semester of studies in my study program and would like to go abroad in my third semester of studies, should I apply now?

Yes, you must apply for the partial study abroad for the 2021/2022 academic year now.

How do I know how many places there are available for a given partner university?

Usually there are 2 to 4 places available (this varies from partner university to partner university), but in the current COVID situation the exact numbers are subject to change.

I am in my 3rd semester of studies and wish to apply to a Spanish university for my 5th semester of studies. Having checked the Spanish universities' course offers, however, I have found that I would be able to have accepted into my study program only 1 or 2 courses. What should I do in this case? Is there a limit to the number of courses I can take in the frame of "reduced curriculum"?

The new Study and Exam Regulations does not maximize the number of courses you can take in the frame of "reduced curriculum", however, you need to make sure in advance whether or not a given course can be taken in this format. In theory this should appear in the course syllabus, however, it's best to double check with the course leader. You can, of course choose to go to such a university as the other courses will be accepted as free electives, however, in this case your graduation will be almost inevitably be delayed.

At the same time, the main aim of the partial studies abroad is that you study abroad without trying to complete courses in parallel in two universities, as you will not have the time to really benefit from the non-academic aims of the partial study abroad.

To what extent does Brexit influence the Erasmus+ program? From the point of view of the program, does the UK continue to be considered an EU member state?

Our partnership contracts with the UK partner universities are valid for the 2021/2022 academic year and it is highly probable that the Erasmus+ program will be available to students going to UK universities. In view of this we continue to recommend the UK universities, although it is worthwhile to also apply to universities in other countries. Prior to travelling abroad, you must check the travel requirements (e.g. need for a visa, etc.).

Do I need to have 21 credits remaining for the finishing of my study program at the time of application or at the time of travel? Is there anything I should take into consideration if I plan to travel in my last semester of studies?

You must have 21 credits remaining to finish your study program in the semester of your partial studies abroad. (The Thesis Seminar and mandatory internship cannot be calculated into the 21 remaining credits!)

If you plan to go abroad in your last semester of studies, you should know that you will be able to graduate the earliest in the semester following your partial study abroad period. The decision on accepting the credits and grades earned abroad will only be possible in the academic semester (not immediately upon your return) following your partial studies abroad semester.

How do I know which of the courses offered at a partner university are equivalent to given courses in my study program?

Check for the course syllabi of the courses to be taken at the partner university on their website or, if it is not available there, contact the International Office of the given partner university and request their assistance in getting the course syllabi. You can then check with the course leader of the course at Corvinus to determine whether there is an at least 75% similarity between the two courses (the one at the partner university and the one you would be taking at Corvinus), i.e. whether it will be accepted as being equivalent. You can also check with the Erasmus+ mentor of your study program or the program director. Be careful, as courses that have the same title may differ largely in actual content!

Can I take free elective courses abroad even if I have already completed the required 10 credits of free electives? Will they be accepted? Do Phys.Ed. courses count into the number of required courses to be taken abroad?

Yes, you can take free elective courses abroad even if you have already met the 10-credit free elective course requirement of your study program. These will be accepted as free electives and you will not have to pay for any extra credits over the max. credits of the program if these are achieved in the frame of partial training abroad. You can take a Phys.Ed. course abroad, however this will not be accredited towards your study program at Corvinus, nor can it be calculated into the min. 21 credits to be completed abroad.

Is there any regulation on how many core and/or core elective courses I must take in the frame of the partial training abroad? Is it possible to take just core elective and/or free elective courses?

The regulations only require that you successfully complete 21 credits in the frame of the partial training. There is no rule on how many core, core elective, or free elective courses you must take. At the same time, from the point of view of your academic progress, it is best that you take as many

courses as you can that can be accredited towards your study program as core and/or core elective courses.

How hard is it to travel to the USA in view of the current pandemic situation?

Currently, it is possible to travel to the USA and Canada for study purposes (this is subject to change). In the case of our partner universities in these two countries, the question is more whether they can host incoming exchange students and whether they offer F2F teaching or only online courses.

As in the case of all countries, in the current situation it is extremely hard to predict what the situation will be in the 2021/2022 academic year, although it is expected that the coronavirus vaccination will be available by the end of the first quarter of 2021.

If my application for the fall semester is successful, but I am unable to travel abroad after all in the fall semester, can I defer my mobility period to the spring semester of 2022?

Yes, it is possible to defer the mobility period within a given academic year (e.g. because of the pandemic), but in all cases, this must first be approved (and well in advance) by the host institution. Please contact Ms. Dora Szakonyi and/or Ms Esztella Varga with such queries.

Must I choose a field of studies directly related to my study program or can I also take courses during the partial training abroad in other fields of study?

You can choose courses from any field of study that is included in your study program and from which you will be able to have core, core elective or free elective courses accredited into your program. In order to avoid having to delay your graduation, however, it is recommended that you complete at the host university as many core and core elective courses that can be accredited to your study program as possible.

Does the minimum 21 credit required till I complete (gain absolved status in) my study program mean that I must be able to accredit all the 21 credits achieved abroad to my study program and my application will only be valid if I am able to meet this requirement? (I.e. I will have to complete at least 21 credits of my study program at the host institution?). Do the courses achieved in the frame of reduced curriculum count into the 21 credits?

All the courses, credits and grades achieved abroad will be accredited to your study program at Corvinus. The 21-credit rule is made up of two parts: 1) you must have min 21 credits (not counting the Thesis Seminar and the mandatory internship if applicable) to complete for your Corvinus study program at the time you go for your partial training abroad period. 2) The Erasmus+ regulation requires that you must complete at least 21 credits successfully during your partial training period at the host institution.

I would like to go abroad in my last (5th) semester of my MSc program and plan to have completed all my core and core elective courses before the partial training period. This means that I will have only 10 free elective credits remaining to finish the program requirements. Is it possible to add a further 11 free elective credits to this to have the required 21 credits? Would my graduation still be delayed till the next semester?

If you have only 10 credits remaining to finish your study program at Corvinus at the time you go for the partial training period, you do not meet the min. 21 credits remaining to reach “absolved” status, thus you will not be able to go for a partial training period.

All students who go abroad in their last semester of studies must know that they will only be able to graduate at the end of the semester after the semester in which they were abroad. The Credit Transfer Committee only meets at the beginning of each semester (it is only by then that all the transcripts from the host institutions are definitely available).

As regards free elective courses – can I only choose courses from my Corvinus study program curriculum at the host university or also ones that are not included in my curriculum, but are available at the host university?

In the case of free electives, you are not restricted to your Corvinus study program curriculum. All courses successfully completed abroad and not included in your Corvinus curriculum will be accredited towards your program as free elective courses.

Where can I check what courses the given partner universities offer for exchange students to know what core or core elective courses I could achieve abroad? Will I be able to take all the courses of the semester that I will spend abroad at the partner university?

You can check the website of the partner university or the website of the International Office of the partner university you are interested in applying to for the courses offered (and the language they are taught in) to exchange students. You need to check how many of the courses included in your curriculum can be achieved there. Please be sure to get a course description and check with the Corvinus professor who is the course leader of the equivalent course in your program as two courses with the same title may differ in content.

It is highly doubtful that you will find a partner university where you can take all the courses of your curriculum for the given semester. At the same time, you can take courses from later semesters if you have already completed the prerequisite course(s) or if they have no prerequisites.

Where can we check how many places are available at given partner universities?

The number of exchange places available at the individual partner universities is set out in the bilateral contracts. This information, however, is irrelevant from the point of view of the applications as in some cases, it may be easier (e.g. for financial reasons) to get a place at a partner university where there are only 1 or 2 available places, than to one where there are more.

The most important factor to consider when applying is how many of the core and core elective courses in your study program you will be able to complete at the partner university/universities you apply for. (This will help ensure that you be able to graduate on time.)

If I will be finishing my bachelor level studies at Corvinus this year and know already that I would like to continue my master studies here, can I apply now in order to be able to take part in partial training studies in the first academic year of my MSc program?

Yes, you can apply in such cases, however, if your application is successful, you will be able to go for the partial training period only if you are indeed accepted to Corvinus and are officially enrolled in the MSc program at the time of the partial studies abroad program.

Can I put down the same university as my first two choices, only with one application for the fall semester and one for the spring semester.

Yes, this is possible.

The course lists available for exchange students at partner institutes listed in the Mobility Manager are often outdated (i.e. list courses from previous academic years). Can we take it for certain that these courses will also be offered in 2021/2022 or is it best to check out the website of the partner universities in all cases?

Usually there is little if any change in the course offer for exchange students. At the same time, as – similarly to Corvinus – there are changes in the curricula of study programs at other universities, as well, it's best to check that the courses you wish to take will, indeed, be offered.

Where can I check which study programs belong to which fields of study?

This is given on Corvinus's website under the "Programs" menu (look for your degree program, check out the detailed information about the program). You will find the answer under "Specialization".

Can I take only courses that are included in the curriculum of my study program?

No, this is not a requirement as you can also have free electives accredited to your program. At the same time, in order, to avoid a delay in your graduation, we recommend that you take as many core and core elective courses abroad as possible.

How can I best check in advance whether given courses will be accepted to my study program? What should I check, what documents will I need?

Check the courses available to exchange students at the partner university. If you cannot find the syllabi of the courses on the university site, write to their International Office and request their assistance. Once you have the course syllabi available, check with the course leader of the given courses at Corvinus to make sure that they will be accepted. You will have to get the course leaders' prior approval for the accreditation of the core and core elective courses taken at a partner university in advance of filling out the Learning Agreement.

If, in the Mobility Manager, the primary language of tuition given is given as German, but the guidance shows the primary language required to be English, which should I consider to be valid?

In such cases, please check the course offer of the university to see which courses are offered in which language.

[How can I get hold of the curricula of the partner university and the course offer for incoming exchange students in the easiest way?](#)

It is not the curricula of the partner university you should check, but rather what courses are open to exchange students. Corvinus doesn't make all its English degree program courses available to incoming exchange students either.

It is best to check first and foremost the website of the given partner university's International Office. If you cannot find a course list there, then you can write to them directly to ask for the list.

[Will the list of university to which we can apply change till the Call for Applications or will the list remain unchanged?](#)

New universities will not be added although the list of universities may be narrowed if we are informed that a partner university will not be able to host exchange students in a given semester due to the pandemic situation.

[Is it possible to apply for partial training to Russia?](#)

Yes, we have partners in Moscow and St Petersburg. Please check the list of partner universities for details.

[If I would like to go to the US next fall, should I apply now?](#)

Yes, you should apply for any planned academic mobility in the 2021/2022 academic year now. At the same time, there may be a second call for applications for any free places remaining for the 2022 spring semester mobility period.

[If the university I would like to apply for has the study program I am studying in, but Corvinus does not have an agreement with the relevant Faculty of the partner university, is it possible to initiate that Corvinus sign an agreement also with the given Faculty?](#)

Please choose a university where Corvinus has an agreement with the Faculty you need to study in. We cannot sign any new agreements at this point in time.

[Is it possible to apply for both the Fall and Spring semesters?](#)

Yes, this is possible. You can choose to apply to the same university for the two semesters, but you can also choose to apply to one university in the Fall and another one in the Spring.

[As the course lists available on the partner universities' websites are usually out of date, is it worthwhile to request an updated list from the International Office of the partner university now?](#)

Yes, it is suggested that you start to check out the course offer of the partner university you choose to apply to already now. You will be able to take a responsible decision on which universities to apply to only if you know what their course offer is, as you are best off completing as many core and core elective courses of your study program as possible during your Partial Study period.

What do the “a” and “b” languages mean in the list of partner institutions?

This means they offer courses in both languages. Make sure to double check which course is offered in which language if you speak only one of the two languages.

I am a Chinese national, but I have never studied in a Chinese school. Will this influence in any way my application if I choose to apply to a Chinese university?

This always depends on the partner university. Some will allow students of their own nationality to go there for partial study, while others will not accept applications from their own nationals.

If I plan to go for Partial Studies in the 5th semester of my studies, will I be able to graduate on time? How does the reduced curriculum work?

If you take all the core and core elective partner university as you need, then it is possible that you will be able to finish on time. In order to ensure that you be able to graduate on time, it is extremely important that you check the course offer of the university/ies you wish to apply to, and, of course, consult with the course leaders at Corvinus, as well as, your program director.

There is no restriction as regards the number of courses you can take in the frame of “reduced curriculum”, however, it is extremely important that you check with the course leader(s) of the course(s) you wish to take in this form as soon as possible to make sure 1) it is possible to take the given course in this format, 2) to check out under what conditions – assignments, readings, deadlines, etc. – you can achieve a given course in this format, as well as when you would be able to take the final exam.

Please note that it is your responsibility to check any changes in university regulations (e.g. the Partial Studies Regulation – by now, outdated) for any new updates. (Main page – The University – Regulations).

As a student in the International Relations program, which Spanish universities will I be able to apply for? What is the name of the study programs there that would be similar to mine?

Don’t look for study programs, rather, check the courses available to incoming exchanges students.

If a course that is worth 5 credits at Corvinus, but only 4 credits at the partner university, with how many credits will it be accredited to my study program?

This is a matter that will be decided by the Credit Transfer Committee, however, if the course leader of the course at Corvinus states that the course at the partner university is equivalent to the course at Corvinus, then it will most probably be accepted with the credit value of the Corvinus course.

Do I have to pay a tuition fee at the host institution if the agreement is a bilateral one (not Erasmus+) or will the tuition fee I pay at Corvinus cover my tuition fee at the host institution?

You only have to pay a tuition fee at Corvinus as all partial training studies are based on exemption from having to pay a tuition fee at the partner university. Please note, however, that the Erasmus+ scholarship is not available in the case of universities outside of the Erasmus+ countries.

Are Corvinus students usually able to choose suitable courses abroad? Can they usually take their core courses at the partner university?

The degree to which you will be able to take core, core elective courses that fit into your study program and will be accredited towards it depends totally on your choice of where you apply to and whether or not you have double-checked the course offer there. For a course to be accredited to your study program at Corvinus, there must be an at least 75% overlap in the content. It is the course leader of the given Corvinus course who will be able to decide on the equivalency (based on the course syllabus of the partner university's course).

Is it possible to take Thesis Seminar I. during the Partial Studies abroad?

In theory, it is not impossible, however, you must check with the Thesis Seminar professor as it is he/she who will know whether the tasks, assignments and deadlines can be achieved from abroad. If you are allowed to do so, make sure to sort out all the assignments you will have to complete while you are abroad and the deadlines for submission and be sure to meet the requirements set by the Thesis Seminar leader.

If the partner universities will not reply to e-mails before we are nominated, how can we get the course syllabi from them?

The partner universities do reply to queries from students. It is only any specific information regarding the semester abroad that they will not reply to until you have been nominated.

You can write to them to ask for given course syllabi (giving the precise course code and course title) if you have checked and it is not available anywhere on their website.

Can we apply to a partner university where our study program is not among those preferred?

Yes, but remember, you will have to accredit at least 21 credits towards your study program, thus it is best that you choose a partner university where courses in your field of study are offered.

If I apply for the CEMS program, does this mean that I am also automatically applying for the Partial Studies abroad?

No. The two applications are separate. While the CEMS program does require that you spend a semester abroad at a CEMS partner university, CEMS students must apply for the Partial Studies the same as all other students.

As a student in the International Relations program can I apply only to universities that offer courses in this field or can I also choose universities offering other fields of study?

You can apply to any university; however, it is your responsibility to check that you will be able to accredit core and core elective courses to your program if you wish to be able to graduate on time.

In the case of core elective courses to be taken at a partner university, are we tied to our program's curriculum fully or is there more flexibility in the case of these courses? If yes, whom should we consult with?

In the case of core elective courses, it is obviously preferred that you try to find an equivalent course at the host university. However, if you find something that is tied to the given field of studies, but is different from what is offered in your curriculum, it's best to consult with the program director as it is s/he who can give permission to have the course taken abroad to be accredited as a core elective course. If you have the program director's approval, the chances of the Dean giving his/her permission is higher.

I will be going on Partial Training in the 5th semester of studies. Can I take a course there that is offered at Corvinus only in the 6th semester? If yes, does this mean that if I complete the course successfully, I will not have to take it at Corvinus?

Yes, you can complete a 6th semester course abroad (if it has no prerequisites you haven't completed as yet). If, however, as a result of this, you miss out on taking a 5th semester core or core elective course, you will have to take it later on.

As a master degree student can I apply for a partner university that is only a Corvinus partner for bachelor programs?

Yes, as it is possible to accredit bachelor level courses as free electives, however, you will not be able to have bachelor level courses accredited as core or core elective courses to your master degree program.

Questions related to language proficiency requirements

At the Orientation Session it was mentioned that only foreign language proficiency exams registered in Neptun will be considered when the points for applicants are calculated. I have a TOEFL iBT / IELTS language proficiency result that is not registered in Neptun. How will I be able to get points for it?

As these two foreign language proficiency exam results can only be entered in Neptun after an official recognition procedure, it is easiest if you simply upload a copy of your official exam result in your application (this is valid only for TOEFL and IELTS exams!).

Please note, however, that those studying in English degree programs will automatically receive the maximum points possible for foreign language proficiency.

If I am applying to a university where the foreign language proficiency requirement is other than English, do I have to upload the result by the application deadline or can I upload it later?

You will receive only points officially due to you for foreign language exams registered in Neptun or full points if you are studying in an English degree program. If the language requirement at a partner university is other than English and you do not have an exam result in the given language, you will be able to upload the result till the end of the end of the appeal period.

If an advanced level language proficiency exam is required at a given university, can I still take the exam in December (the result will be available in January) can I apply for the university?

If you will be able to provide the results until the end of the appeal period, yes, you can apply to the university if you take the exam now.

If I handed in a foreign language proficiency result at the time of enrolling to Corvinus, was this automatically registered in Neptun?

In theory, yes, but it is best to double check. Please note TOEFL ITP tests are not considered official for the present purposes and cannot be entered in Neptun, nor will they be considered.

What should I do if I have taken the TOEFL iBT exam, but have not received the official hard copy result because of the pandemic?

In this case, please print the result from your TOEFL exam site and have the testing center where you took it, verify it officially.

The International Baccalaureate is considered to be equivalent to a C1 level exam in the language in which it was taken. Will it be considered as a foreign language proficiency exam?

Yes, however, please check to make sure that it is registered in Neptun as such.

How can I find out what the precise foreign language proficiency expectation is of a partner institution? There is some information in the last column of the partner institution table, however, it is not always clear whether a Hungarian state language proficiency exam will be accepted.

It is easiest to check out the website of the partner university. If the requirement given is B2, then the partner institution has no special expectations (e.g. C1 or IELTS / TOEFL iBT). In this case it is your responsibility that your level of knowledge is suitable to follow the courses in the given language.

If I have taken a foreign language proficiency exam, but have not yet received the official certificate, but only a statement that I was successful, can this be entered in Neptun?

No. Only fully official foreign language proficiency certificates can be entered in Neptun.

Is a professional B2 foreign language exam acceptable? If yes, is it a problem if I get it after the application period but before travelling abroad?

Yes, it is acceptable, however, it must be registered in Neptun by the end of the application period, otherwise you will not be given points for it.

Will the Campus Mundi scholarship be available after March 2021? What other scholarship options are available for non-Erasmus+ places?

If I apply to a university that is not included in the Erasmus+ program and Campus Mundi is no longer available, will I have to cover all the travel and living costs myself?

We do not know till when Campus Mundi will be available, however, in addition to Campus Mundi, Corvinus's partial study support (HSZB) will continue to be available.

I have heard that the application requirements have changed (students who are officially residents of Budapest or Pest county are not eligible) – how certain is this information?

At this point in time we have no information available whether Campus Mundi will be available for the 2021/2022 academic year and, if yes, under what conditions.

If I apply for a partial training outside of the Erasmus+ participating countries, will I have to cover the full costs of the partial studies myself?

If it is still possible to apply for Campus Mundi and you are eligible for it, then you will be able to apply for it. The Partial Studies Abroad scholarship of HSZB will continue to be available.

Questions re. the motivational letter

Can I submit more than just the required 3 motivational letters for the first 3 universities of my choice?

Yes, but as only those submitted for the first 3 places evaluated will be checked, there is no real sense in doing so.

Do I have to write the motivational letter in the language of my studies at Corvinus?

The motivational letter must always be submitted in the language in which you will be taking courses at the partner university.

When writing the motivation letter, you must include the following information: Well supported reasoning for your choice of the given university. Details on the courses you plan to take at the given university (please indicate which of these are core, core elective or free elective courses). Any further gains / advantages you will get from going to the university of your choice.

Should I address the motivational letter to the partner university?

No. These will be a part of your application material and will be evaluated at Corvinus.

Partial studies abroad – academic scholarship?

As my semester must be “active” during the partial studies abroad, will I get my academic scholarship due for the given semester.

Based on the current Corvinus regulations in effect, yes.

Questions related to how points are given for the application

Which semester’s scholarship GPA will be looked at when points are determined?

The points for scholarship GPA will be based on your scholarship GPA average for all the semesters in which you achieved at least 20 credits.

Will the points for freshman students be calculated on a different scale than for higher year students?

Yes, the Call for Application clearly shows the two different point calculations for used freshman and for higher year students.

There is no difference in the application process for the freshman and higher year students.

What is the number of points usually required for an application to be successful?

If your application meets the requirements set out in the Call for Applications, we will almost certainly be able to offer you a place. Obviously, the more popular places will require higher points, however, this is also influenced by the number of places available at the given university and the number of applications received for it. This changes from year to year.

Will I receive extra points for participation in previous Erasmus events or other national or international activities?

Yes, precise details please check the Call for Applications.

How many points will the oral exam be worth this year?

There will be no oral exams this year.

The Call for Applications states that I can get 2 points for participating in national competitions. Is this true also for competitions in which I will participate only later on?

For precise details please check the Call for Applications.

Will I be able to get extra points if I will join a student organization only in the spring semester?

Points will be calculated for all certified student organization activities achieved in Fall 2020 or previously. It is not possible to give points for activities not yet achieved.

Questions related to Erasmus+ internships

[Are there any organizations/institutions that deal specifically with Erasmus+ internships?](#)

There are a number of online portals that specialize in advertising internship positions. The majority of the positions offered meet the requirements of the Erasmus+ positions (venue of work in an Erasmus+ country, at least 30 workhours per week, min. 60 days, non-EU organizations), and of course, the Erasmus+ internship scholarship can be applied for.

Important: Take care when looking for an internship position. It best not to search via intermediary portals and companies, but to contact companies offering internship positions directly. When getting to know the company, be circumspect as there are more and more problems in certain cases.

[When I travel abroad for an internship during the semester, must my student status be active?](#)

Yes, your student status must be active throughout the duration of the Erasmus+ internship mobility (if it takes place during the summer, but overlaps just a single day with the academic semester, you must be in active status for the semester – if not, you must repay the Erasmus+ scholarship. The only exception to this is if you achieve the Erasmus+ internship after you have reached „absolved” status.

The Erasmus+ internship has two types: one achieved while in student status which must finish before the student achieves „absolved” status (in such cases, the student must be in „active” status throughout the internship period), while the other starts after the student has achieved „absolved” status and must finish within 12 months of having reached „absolved” status.

Information regarding the Call for Applications

[Where will information on the Erasmus+ application be available?](#)

The Call for Applications is available on the university website (<https://www.uni-corvinus.hu/main-page/programs/international-opportunities/erasmus-2/outgoing-students-partial-training/?lang=en#null>) under „Participation in international student mobility programmes”. Read it carefully as you will find all the required information in it, including how points will be calculated.

The results of the applications – points achieved by the applicants – will be posted on the Corvinus website sometime in February. All applicants will be informed directly on where they can check their points.

Cancelling a successful application

What can I do if my application was accepted, but for some reason or other I choose not to travel abroad after all?

You can cancel your successful application without any financial consequences right up to the time of signing the scholarship contract.
