7. Bachelor's degree training objectives and professional competences

The objective of the international relations undergraduate programme is the training of intellectuals who are capable of navigating the world of international relations, of appropriately representing national and regional interests, sensitive to global issues, capable of handling the challenges of the European integration process, and open to learning about other cultures who can work in Hungarian or international corporate, governmental, and non-governmental organisations in international communications, creative problem-handling, and the flexible solution of complex tasks, and are prepared to continue their training at the Master's level.

1. Attained professional competences

Is knowledgeable regarding the generally accepted tendencies, characteristics and data of Hungarian and international political, economic, and cultural phenomena.

8. Bachelor's degree characteristics

1. Professional properties

1. The scientific fields and areas that the training is based on are:

general social science knowledge and competences [Economics, Introduction to Law, Philosophy, Political Science, Sociology, History (Modern Hungarian and World History) Informatics] 20-60 credits;

methodological and skills development knowledge (Statistics, Social Statistics, Qualitative and Quantitative Methodology, Terminology Exercises) 20-30 credits;

professional skills related to international relations: 50-100 credits, including the credit value of the thesis, as per the following:

the history of international relations [The History of International Relationships from 1815 to 1989, The History of Hungarian Foreign Policy, The History of Diplomacy, International Relations in the New World Order (from 1989)] 5-40 credits;

the theory and practice of international politics (The Main Schools of International Political Theory, The Theory and Practice of Diplomacy) 5-40 credits;

international law (International Public Law, International Civil Law, International Treaties, International Institutions and Organisations) 5-40 credits;

international economics (International Economics, Foreign Economic Policy, International Finance, World Economy, International Business Economics) 5-40 credits;

regional-civilisational studies (History of Civilization, History of European Civilization, Regional Studies) 5-40 credits;

the European Union (The Developmental History of the European Union, EU Institutions and Decision-making, EU Law, EU Jurisdictions and Policies, Hungary in the European Union, European Union Tender Writing and Project Management) 5-40 credits;

the practice of international relations (Techniques of International Communication, International Events, Diplomatic Protocol, Negotiation Techniques) 5-40 credits.

2. Specialisation recommended by the educational institution constitutes theoretical and practical knowledge that is capable of working on the given field, improves personal abilities, and results in specialised competences relevant to individual interests. In the entirety of the programme, trade-specific knowledge accounts for 30-35 credits.

2. Specific features that distinguish the training

In order to obtain the qualification in the initial training, an intermediate level (level B2) of foreign language proficiency in at least two foreign languages is required, one of which is the level of foreign language proficiency in the specialised field.

3. Internship requirements

The internship is a continuous placement of at least 120 hours (four weeks) as defined in the training curriculum. The internship may be completed in the sixth semester of the course, but after the end of the second semester. . Defined in the Study and Examination Regulations.

9. Degree thesis/ Dissertation

The aim of the degree thesis is to demonstrate the student's knowledge and expertise in a chosen topic, scientific data collection, systematization, analysis and processing related to the chosen topic, discussion of the chosen phenomenon or problem, hypothesis creation, problem solving, analysis of alternative hypotheses, argumentation and in refuting the counter-arguments, in a coherent, consistent, language-oriented written explanation of his thoughts, views, positions, statements.

10. Type of Degree thesis

Research thesis.

11. Foreign language competence in a specialised language other than English:

The acquisition of foreign language competence in a specialised language other than the language of training may be achieved by completing the "foreign language competence I." course of a 0 credit value and a signed, non-contact-hour criterion course. This subject is included in the penultimate semester of the degree programme, but is recommended to be taken in the bachelor program from the 5th semester onwards.

Expected level: An accredited complex exam - assessing writing, reading, listening and speaking skills - in a modern foreign language for specific purposes at CEFR B2 level or above (in the field of the relevant university programme)."

12. Requirements for the issue of a final certificate

The University will issue a final certificate to the student who has obtained the study and examination regulation prescribed in the curriculum, and the required internship (professional experience), the required credits.

13. Conditions for admission to the final examination

Joint conditions for admission to the final exam:

- a. obtaining a final certificate,
 - b. submission of the dissertation by the deadline,
 - c. evaluation of the dissertation with at least a satisfactory (2) grade
 - d. registration for the final exam by the deadline,
 - e. the student has no overdue payment debt to the University for the given training,
 - f. accounted for with assets owned by the University (borrowed books, sports equipment, etc.).
- A student who has not fulfilled any of the provisions of the points a)-f) cannot be admitted to the final examination.

14. Parts of the final exam

The final exam consists of the defense of the dissertation and the oral complex exam.

15. Determining the result of the final exam

The weighted arithmetic mean of the following three digits, rounded to two decimal places:

- a. The grade given to the dissertation by the reviewer (s) - determined with a five-point qualification - in case of several reviewers the average of the marks of the reviews is rounded to two decimal places, and
- b. the grade obtained for the defense of the dissertation, the answer to the questions related to the dissertation - established with a five-level qualification
- c. the grade given for the oral complex examination - determined with a five-grade qualification - with double weight. The arithmetic mean of the following three digits, rounded to two decimal places:

A subject that can be completed in a preferential study order (PSO) on the basis of Section 92 of the Study and Examination Regulation (TVSZ)

Physical education

Physical education is a criterion subject, the condition for obtaining a diploma is the completion of two semesters. The two semesters of physical education can be completed in 4 semesters from the start of studies. Students who have fulfilled the criterion can only take the subject in the form of reimbursement for a fee.

Foreign language

During their studies, students can study a foreign language free of charge for two semesters, including a specific language, within the framework of the elective subjects.

Students who have completed two semesters of language subjects may take additional language subjects only upon payment of a specified fee.

Curriculum

It is recommended to include the subjects in the schedule according to the sample curriculum. The student may deviate from this, taking into account:

1. the pre-study order,

*: Hungarian Language is a compulsory subject for the students participating in the Stipendium Hungaricum scholarship program in the first two semesters.
